# **WIZARD OF OZ**



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The city's origins lie in a surge in nineteenth century urbanisation which ringed the Pacific with a network of bustling commercial cities: Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane, Auckland, San Francisco, Seattle and Vancouver. They grew as gateways to their expansive hinterlands, facilitating European settlement and the harnessing of their developing regional economies to world money and produce markets.

They were cities of the nineteenth century, built from scratch, their spatial form shaped by the latest technological innovations and their social economic structures mirroring the logic of modern capitalist market place. Melbourne - fittingly dubbed "Marvellous Melbourne" by George Sala in 1888, encapsulates this remarkable city's building progress. Melbourne was for most of the nineteenth century the most remarkable of these Pacific Rim cities, and the largest in both population and in physical extent.

The growth of this city is often taken

for granted, but Melbourne was not predetermined or inevitable. It was established by speculators technically in breach of the law. The hinterland was not given out to capitalists but licensed, leased and purchased by investors and speculators.

This entrepreneurial quality was reinforced by the gold discoveries which attracted settlers who were young, enterprising and independent. These were the people who opposed state aid to religion, fought for the eight hour day, pressed for land to be opened up to the small settler and most dramatically espoused the protection of local industry ~ inverting the orthodoxies of Great Britain.

A strong imprint remains of the industries established between 1860 and 1890, especially in areas like clothing and footwear establishing Marvellous Melbourne as the shopping capital of Australia even today.

### AUSTRALIAN ARGYLE PINK DIAMONDS

Argyle pink diamonds are the rarest and most beautiful gems mined by Argyle Diamonds in the East Kimberley region of Western Australia. At less than one percent of all production, Pink Diamonds are still one of the world's best-kept secrets and desirable gems in the world. The Australian Pink Diamonds are not just known for their spectacular colour, but their investment potential as well.

On average, the Argyle pink diamonds have increased by 20% every year over the past last 10 years. This is due to a number of reasons, such as its rarity, the demand for pinks is increasing, while the supply is reducing, as the Argyle mine moves towards the end of its lifespan, the number of pink diamonds found is decreasing.

Argyle Pink diamonds range from



Red as being the rarest and most expensive to Purplish Pink (darkest PP1 to lightest 9PP), Pink (darkest P1 to lightest 9P) and Pink Rose (darkest 1PR to lightest 9PR). The purplish stone tend to give the diamond a stronger and more intense look while the pink rose tend to have a champagne shade to the diamonds.

### AUSTRALIAN OPALS

**Around 90% of the world's precious opal comes from Australia, where unique geological conditions allowed the formation of this rare gemstone.**

Most light opal is found in South Australia, black opal in New South Wales - especially Lightning Ridge, and boulder opal in Queensland. In one precious opal you may see all the colours of the rainbow. As early as the 1st century A.D. the Roman Pliny wrote: No other gemstone can display all the colours of the spectrum in such an infinite variety of shades, patterns and brilliance. No two are identical; for this reason the proud owner can delight in the fact that their gem is unique. The first discovery of common opals in Australia was made in 1849.



The early Greeks believed the opal bestowed powers of foresight and prophecy upon its owner, while in Arabian folklore, it is said that the stone fell from heaven in flashes of lightning. Ancient Romans provided the first real market for opal. The important opal mining areas in Australian opal production over the last century have been White Cliffs, The Queensland Fields, Lightning Ridge, Grawin & Glengarry, Coober Pedy, Andamooka, Mintabie and Lambina.

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**Howey Place, formerly known as “Cole’s Walk” is a shopping arcade in Melbourne, Victoria. It is a short, narrow covered laneway, running south from Little Collins Street between Swanston Street and Elizabeth Street in the central business district of Melbourne.**

Located in the heart of the shopping precinct, Howey Place is currently flanked with small designer fashion shops. It joins

with the Sportsgirl Centre, a shopping mall at 234 Collins Street which runs through to Collins Street, as well forming an “L” shape toward the back of the Capitol Arcade which connects it with Swanston Street.

### **HISTORY**

Before 1896, Howey Place was just a drab lane. In 1896 the lane was covered with a glass canopy and created glass showcases along the street to attract tenants.

Howey House, a tall art-deco building and part of the Collins Street in the 1930s once connected the lane to Collins Street via an open laneway, however Howey House was demolished in the 1980s for the construction of the Sportsgirl Centre, a modern shopping mall.



Flinders Street Station is Australia's oldest train station, and with its distinctive yellow facade and green copper dome it's a city icon. Takeaway stands line the concourse, and the upper floors were purpose-built to house a library, gym and a lecture hall, later used as a ballroom.

Flinders Street is the busiest suburban railway station in the southern hemisphere, with over 1500 trains and 110,000 commuters passing through each day.

Listed on the Victorian Heritage Register, its 708-metre main



platform is the fourth longest railway platform in the world.




**Chapel Street is a shopping, dining and entertainment precinct in.**

It has myriad shops ranging from exclusive upmarket fashion designers at the South Yarra end to old fashion pawnbrokers towards Windsor. Virtually from its beginning Chapel Street, between Toorak Road and Dandenong Road was a trading and shopping street with flour milling, butchers, bakers, drapers, boot makers, general stores, carpenters, bricklayers, farrier and blacksmiths, chemists and an undertaker. At the start of the 20th century large multi-level emporiums (department

stores) began to spring up in the Prahran section of the street. At this point, Chapel Street rivalled the CBD as Melbourne's shopping destination. Emporium development continued right through to the 1930s.

In the 1970s, Prun Central opened as a major shopping mall. In the 1980s, the Jam Factory and Como Centre at the South Yarra end were the biggest developments to effect the character of the street. Gentrification ensured that this end became home to boutique fashion stores.

## ST KILDA

Just 6km from the city centre, St Kilda is Melbourne's seaside playground and is much-loved by residents and visitors. St Kilda is renowned for its expansive view of Port Phillip, safe sandy beach, palm-lined boardwalk, huge range of beach activities, big skies, gorgeous sunsets, parks and gardens, great restaurants, bars and cafés, fabulous old buildings, and its colourful past and present. St Kilda is home to many of Melbourne's famous visitor attractions including Luna Park, the Esplanade Hotel, Acland Street and Fitzroy Street. It is home to St Kilda beach, Melbourne's most famous beach, several renowned theatres and several of Melbourne's big events and festivals. The main street in St Kilda is Fitzroy Street. It's lined with outdoor pubs, cafes and restaurants serving a wide variety of cuisines showcasing Melbourne's multicultural heritage. The café society of Acland Street first bloomed with the influx of cosmopolitan European migrants in the 1950s. That heritage can still be seen in the European-style cake shops, cafes and designer shops that line the street.



## HISTORY

The Boon Wurrung people of the Kulin Nation were the traditional owners of the land where St Kilda now sits and called the area Euroe Yroke. There is evidence of their ancient lifestyle throughout St Kilda. Visit where early tribal gatherings were held at the 'Corroboree Tree' a very old red gum tree at St Kilda Junction.

St Kilda was named by Superintendent La Trobe after a watching a boat named 'Lady of St Kilda' anchored off the beach in 1841. During the 1900s, St Kilda became a favoured suburb of Melbourne's elite, and many palatial mansions were constructed along its hills and waterfront. The foreshore became Melbourne's amusement zone with the opening of Luna Park in 1912, at the time the newest and greatest amusement park in the world. Luna Park still operates today where you can enjoy rollercoaster rides and arcade games.

Following WWII, St Kilda became Melbourne's 'red light' district. During the 1960s, it became known for its bohemian style and attracted young artists and musicians taking advantage of cheap housing. The suburb still retains its alternative style today.



## ST KILDA ESPLANADE MARKET

Since 1970, The Esplanade Market has been a St Kilda Sunday delight.

It's famous for a good reason - there's something for everyone and more! Enjoy browsing through works by more than 120 artists and craftspeople in Melbourne's open-air gallery by the sea.

## Hook Turns / City

Hook turn signs are found at some  
intersections in Melbourne's City Centre.  
These signs are found either at the side of  
the road or hung from tram wires above  
the intersection. Make sure you check for  
these signs when driving in Melbourne's city  
centre. If you approach an intersection with  
this sign and you want to make a right hand  
turn make sure you follow these instructions:

1. A hook turn involves turning right  
from the left lane. When you enter the  
intersection stay as far left as possible  
avoiding any marked pedestrian crossings.  
Make sure you are indicating right.
2. Once in the intersection, opposite the  
street you are entering, wait here until the  
lights of the street you are entering have  
turned green. Once clear proceed with your  
right hand turn.

Trains, trams and buses offer comprehensive public transport services extending from the central business district to the suburbs in all directions.

Train and tram services operate between 5am and midnight, Monday to Thursday, with extended hours to around 1am on Friday and Saturday nights.

On Sunday, trains and trams operate 7am to 11pm.

Many of Melbourne's bus routes run from 6am – 9pm Mon – Fri, 8am – 9pm Saturday and 9am – 9pm Sunday.

## TICKETS

myki is Melbourne's ticketing system. myki is a reusable smartcard that can store either myki money (dollar value) or a myki pass (travel days) and these are used to pay for your journey.

Public transport travel is simple to use in Melbourne as myki gives you flexible travel between the three modes of public transport.

You can buy and top up a myki at any Premium Station, 7-Eleven store or independent retailer where you see the myki sign, at myki machines (full fare card sales only) located at all metropolitan train stations and selected accessible tram stops and bus interchanges.

You can also buy or top up your myki online at [myki.com.au](http://myki.com.au) or by calling 1800 800 007 (allow 24 hours to process top up).

A full fare myki card costs \$6 and a concession myki (senior, concession, child) costs \$3.

When traveling with myki, it's important to touch on at a myki reader at the beginning of your trip and touch off at the end of each leg of your journey. Failure to travel with a valid ticket could lead to a fine.

## ZONES

Fares for travelling on Melbourne's trains, trams and buses are separated into two zones: Zone 1 for inner-city and Zone 2 for the middle and outer suburbs. Tickets need to be valid for each zone that you travel in. Use the public transport maps to check what zones you are planning to visit.

# getting around – how to use trams



## GETTING AROUND FOR FREE

### FREE TRAM ZONE

Travel for free on trams in the Free Tram Zone. The Free Tram Zone includes the area from the iconic Queen Victoria Market, across to Victoria Harbour in Docklands, up to Spring Street and over to Flinders Street Station and Federation Square.

Travel on trams within this zone is free, and you don't need a myki, however, if your journey starts or finishes outside the boundaries of the Free Tram Zone, you must touch on your myki at the reader in the normal way to make sure you have a valid ticket.

The City Circle tram continues to operate using Melbourne's iconic W-Class trams and is also free.

### MELBOURNE CITY VISITOR SHUTTLE

The Melbourne Visitor Shuttle stops at 13 key destinations

around the city, including Federation Square, Queen Victoria Market and the Royal Botanic Gardens. It runs every 30 minutes with the first service leaving Stop 1 at 9.30am and the last at 3.45pm daily except shuttle closure days (please refer to the website for dates). Buy tickets online or from the Melbourne Visitor Centre at Federation Square, Fitzroy Gardens Visitor Centre, Melbourne Airport arrivals hall or ticket machines located at each stop. The area not more than one and a half hours drive from the city in any direction - famous for the Leisure Regions. Coach tours are available to most of these regions daily.




## Surrounds
